The university is working hard to recruit and retain motivated students from across California. In the Financial Aid and Scholarships Office, our primary goal is to increase access to higher education by ensuring a clear understanding of resources available to prospective students and families.

I am excited about all the opportunities the new year will bring, including a new award cycle for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and California Dream Act Application. Students and families should apply early, as most financial aid funds are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. The priority deadline for both applications is March 2.

University of California is proud to offer the <u>Blue and Gold Opportunity Plan</u>, which ensures that California undergraduates with an annual family income up to \$80,000 will have their base tuition and fees covered by gift aid. Other resources include the <u>Aggie Grant Plan</u>, the <u>Middle Class Scholarship</u>, <u>merit-based scholarships</u>, <u>work-study</u> and loans.

Our office is also establishing a peer-to-peer <u>financial literacy</u> program to help students gain money management skills and understand their rights and responsibilities in regard to financial aid.

Arnette Bates and Donelle Davis serve as director and assistant director, respectively, for advising and retention services at the UC Davis <u>Student Academic Success Center</u> (SASC). The center offers holistic academic assistance to students as they adapt to the university environment. "We work fervently to support African American students and pay close attention to their needs," says Arnette.

The <u>Special Transitional Enrichment Program</u> (STEP), for instance, brings African American and other newly enrolled freshmen to campus the summer before fall quarter. Four weeks of residential transitional experiences are followed by two years of formal follow-up. Informal support for African diaspora students continues through connection to groups such as the campus African Continuum network.

Arnette and Donelle together have 43 years of experience on campus. As a former first-generation student, Donelle loves to offer others the kind of inspiring support she received. Arnette started as an admission officer then transitioned to campus services. "It is very rewarding to see students grow at UC Davis as we help them set goals and succeed," she

Facilitating honest conversations: First-Year Aggie Connections

This fall, the brand new First-Year Aggie
Connections program facilitated community
and connection for incoming students.
Small groups met once a week during fall
quarter to support students in their
transition to university life.

Dr. Kawami Evans, associate director of the Center for African Diaspora Student Success, led a connections group of <u>Linda Frances Alexander Scholars</u>, an academic enrichment program for African, African American and multi-racial students at UC Davis. She says meeting regularly in small groups allowed honest conversations about campus realities through a cultural lens.

"The First-Year Aggie Connections program gave students tools for success based on personal needs," Kawami says. "We could incorporate black cultural experiences into our curriculum, making learning personal and useful for students' lives."





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
